TWO OVER ONE – SESSION 4

Partner opens 1S; you respond 1NT (no interference by opponent). Your 1NT bid is *invitational*, but not necessarily invitational to game. **Opener** MUST **ALERT** YOU BID AS EITHER **forcing or semi-forcing**.

- Opener must bid again if your partnership agreement is that the 1NT response is forcing.
- Opener may pass if your partnership agreement is that the 1NT response is semi-forcing.

Please know that partner's forcing 1NT response is NOT GAME FORCING (since partner has just 6-11 points). Your 1NT response also let's partner know that you have, at most, just three of her trump.

Opener can choose to force you to bid again after your 1NT response by bidding a new suit at the two-level, or jump shifting (e.g. 1S - P - 1NT - P - 3D...). So, game is still possible if opener has a good hand.

We keep talking about game. Let's talk about that some more. If you open one spade and partner makes a game-forcing two-level bid, what game? Well, 2/1 bidding systems target games in NT, hearts and spades, never a minor suit game. That doesn't mean you won't ever wind up in a minor suit game, but 2/1 targets the lower level games where tricks are worth more points.

Limit raises

Let's talk about limit raises in the 2/1 system. In Standard American, you can make a limit raise with 11-12 points. (I know, I know, many people play a 10-12-point range, but I discourage that)

In 2/1, as a responder to partner's opening bid, you are going to bid one NT with 11 points, whether or not you have support in partner's suit. So, limit raises are more difficult to employ, a disadvantage of the 2/1 bidding system.

Consider this bidding sequence. Partner opens one spade. You bid two clubs. Partner bids either 2 diamonds or two hearts. If you now jump to 3 spades, that is a *limit raise (invitational to game)*. It shows either 10-11 points and support for partner's spades *or it shows (PREFERABLY)*:

- 3-CARD TRUMP SUPPORT AND 7 OR FEWER LTC,
- OR 4-CARD TRUMP SUPPORT AND 8 OR FEWER LTC.

Consider this bidding sequence. Partner opens one heart. You bid two clubs. Partner bids 2 diamonds. You may bid 3 hearts to show a limit raise. But if partner bids 2 hearts or 2 spade or 2 NT after your two-club bid, you cannot show a limit raise. In the example in the previous paragraph, if partner bids either two spades or 2NT after your 2-club response, again, you cannot show a limit raise. But that's OK; you are headed to game anyway.
